

UNIT 2: Toolkit

Creating a mural

This could be created by a small group of students or by the whole school. It could be hung in your school's dining room, hall or entrance foyer, or it could be offered to local groups who are organising public activities on or around 25th November to use as part of their display. You could take a photograph of it and send it to the local paper as part of your campaign publicity.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- Mural paper (ask your Art teacher if there is any in the school, or where you can get some from),
- Thick felt tips or marker pens in a variety of colours, or paint and brushes,
- A copy of the White Ribbon logo,
- Masking tape.

HOW TO DO IT

- Ask an Art teacher if you can arrange a lunch time when you can use the art rooms.
- Check with other year 10 students who are working on these issues to find out how many are interested in helping create the mural (your teacher should make time at the beginning of each lesson for you to update the group on the progress of the campaign. You can use some of this time to recruit extra helpers for specific tasks like this one).
- Arrange a pre-meeting with the people who are going to create the mural when you can decide what you want it to show and who needs to research what.
- You might want to include any or all of the following in the mural, and you might have better ideas than the ones suggested here, but if people need to find images or information before the Mural Creation day, make sure that everyone knows what is needed and who is going to find it.
 - Drawings
 - Photographs
 - Images from magazines
 - Newspaper articles
 - Quotes and sayings
 - Statistics on violence against women
 - Materials from the study units or from the on-line tools
